## European banana market supplies 1988-2001

## 2001: an exemplary year

Examination of the supply of the European banana market shows a limited but overall decrease in supplies. The decrease in quantities available is to be related to the good market prices in 2001. Even if other factors affected banana prices, it can legitimately be considered that the quantity factor is preponderant.

The proverb of the straw that broke the camel's back applies perfectly to the functioning of the European banana market. In 2000, the supply balance (*FruiTrop* 84, page 14) showed that the symbolic 4-million tonne mark had been exceeded and we remember the catastrophic year for the markets. The situation in 2001 was precisely the opposite: supplies were down by a little more than 2% (-93 000 tonnes) and the market was set fair.

All types of origin participated in this decrease in market releases. ACP supplies fell by 3.5% after a particularly plentiful 2000. This group displayed once again the gap between the African ACP countries Cameroon and Côte d'Ivoire, whose releases increased by 5 and 9% respectively,

and the ex traditional ACP countries in the Caribbean, except for Jamaica, that reduced their releases. The Dominican Republic escaped the doldrums, scoring a very strong increase in shipments (+44 %).

Community origins also reduced their shipments (-2%), with marked differences between regions. The Canaries increased their shipments by nearly 6% whereas Martinique (-14%) and Madeira (-8%) reduced theirs.

Dollar zone exports to the EU fell by 2.4% to less than 2.5 million tonnes. The five leading origins strengthened their hold on the market. Ecuador, Colombia, Costa Rica, Panama and Honduras hold 99% of the dollar banana market, which increased by

2%. Ecuador (+4%) and Colombia (+4%) displayed increases, unlike Costa Rica (-4%) and Panama (-11%). Brazil is an origin to be watched. Although it is clearly a minority source of supply (17 000 tonnes), this large fruit-producing country demonstrated its ambitions by increasing its banana shipments to the EU by 31%. Venezuela displayed the opposite trend with -34 %.

Reduced supplies, a marked decrease in fraud, a better market context (weak competition from the other fruits) and more regular supplying of the market form the known recipe for success. It just needs to be applied ■
